

Report from the Scheme manager

I joined the team as Scheme Manager in July 2018, from a background in humanitarian aid and have spent the last 8 months asking lots of questions of Elaine, Lindsay and Mandy who have patiently answered them - often more than once!

Thanks to the hard work of Louise, the previous scheme manager, the Team and the Trustees, I arrived at a time when our new 4 year lottery funding was secured and this was rapidly followed with the WBC funds and this has meant we have more financial stability which enables us to look forward and plan more effectively for the next few years. We were able to reopen referrals again and have been busy recruiting and training new volunteers as the demand for support has grown throughout the year. In October we launched the new lottery funded Tools for Life Project and Teresa joined the team to lead on the set up and coordination of the various activities that make up this project. This has involved a considerable amount of work building a network of support, developing and delivering training and bringing together the resources for our volunteers to use with families.

Christmas was busy with our Christmas Party at Jungle Mania, Father Christmas and his grotto at Wokingham Library and many generous donations through the Giving Tree, Reading Family Aid, the Lions and the Coombes School.

In the new year we ran our latest course for new Volunteers and it was a pleasure to meet and get to know the new volunteers as they went through their course. I have also enjoyed meeting many of the "older/more experienced" volunteers at various events through the year. Without our volunteers we would not be able to offer the support we do for our families and we really appreciate the time and effort that so many make both our home visiting volunteers and also our trustees who also give up their time and skills to help us deliver the support we do. For Red Nose Day we were invited to talk about our work on Berkshire Radio and it was a real privilege to have two of our Mums speak about what Home-Start support means to them.

Within our lottery grant we received some funding to be used to strengthen us as an organisation particularly in the area of IT. This has been invaluable as we have had several IT challenges and have made some significant changes which should lead to the team being able to be much more flexible in our working practices, with working from home an option occasionally.


With the changes required with GDPR we are now embarking on the setting up of a new recording system for our families called Charity Log. This will give us much greater flexibility to record and report more effectively as we can tailor the system to our needs and reporting requirements. Home-Start UK have also now realised that the old MESH system that was used is not fit for purpose and is also moving across to Charity Log which should help us streamline our working somewhat.

Throughout the year we have received fantastic support from The Estate Management College at Shinfield Grange as they provide us with rooms free of charge for many of our activities. This makes a huge difference as it enables us to run our prep course at the office as well as many of our meetings. A special thank you to Andrew and Yvonne for their support.

Moving forwards there is much still to do. Demand for our services is growing and the complexity of issues that many of our families face means our support is needed more than ever and we need to continue to learn and increase our own knowledge if we are to be able to provide the support required and also enable our volunteers to really make a difference. This also means we need to continue to seek additional funding and to look to tailor our services to meet the needs of families across the Wokingham Borough.

I am delighted that this year we are celebrating the work of our volunteers, both home visiting volunteers and trustees and alongside this, the team deserve recognition for the work that they have done through very difficult and uncertain times. Thank you to Elaine, Mandy, Lindsay and Teresa for the work you do to support the volunteers and the families and I look forward to working with you over the coming year as we continue to work hard to provide a quality service and together make a real difference here in Wokingham. We have an exciting and busy year ahead!

Early last January I spotted an advert for a training course for new Home-Start volunteers, due to start at the end of the month. Having worked in early years education I am aware of the impact that children's early experiences have on their lives and future outcomes, so a charity which supports parents and their children through those years was something I was keen to support. I had recently retired and had time available, and had a friend in another region who'd enthused about being a Home-Start volunteer, so I decided to find out more and got in touch. A visit from Mandy at my home was quickly arranged and she explained more about the scheme, which confirmed for me that I wanted to volunteer. Forms were promptly sent out, filled in, references duly submitted and accepted, and by the end of the month I was heading into the first session of the 8 week volunteer training course.

Ten new volunteers arrived (with 2 more joining after the first session), with a diversity of experiences, ages, backgrounds and varying degrees of excitement, nervousness, curiosity and enthusiasm, but we were put at ease by the friendly, welcoming and highly professional team of Home-Start employees running and supporting the course, and as the course progressed over the following weeks and as the volunteers got to know one another we were able to support one another and learn from one another through sharing friendship, ideas, concerns and experiences.

We were issued with a file containing support material for the training along with a multitude of forms and policies, which were tackled gradually over the weeks. The training was well planned and prepared, very interactive and varied. Some of it was fun, some interesting, and some of it tackled quite sombre and harrowing scenarios which made us all feel a little daunted, yet it was clear that we would be well supported by the staff team at all times. It was pointed out that some of these scenarios were extreme and we were unlikely to meet them, but needed to be aware. Safeguarding training is, of course, an important part of the training, as were the discussions about how to set appropriate boundaries, how to keep ourselves safe, and also the importance of offering non-judgemental support and friendship to the families with whom we would be paired. We were encouraged to examine our own attitudes and views, and explored how, as a group, whilst we all shared some attitudes, we had different ideas on other issues. We were also give training on the new 'Tools for Life' initiative. I think the volunteers came out of each week's training feeling we had gained new insights and had our horizons expanded, and enjoyed our time together in the process. On the final week, those who wished to exchanged contact details in order to keep in touch and support one another, and we had a short one-to-one session to be told about the family we were to be paired with, and who our supervisor would be.

It was very re-assuring to have Mandy arrange and accompany me on the first visit to my family, leaving me to it after I'd settled in to chat with the mother and play with the children. I am now in the swing of my (mostly) weekly visits which I enjoy, the children are always excited when I arrive, and the mother always seems very pleased to have someone come to share the load for a couple of hours. It's early days for me as a volunteer, but I would unreservedly recommend it.

Vicky

I became a Homestart volunteer just under 3 years ago. I am now on my second family (although I still see my first family regularly) and still enjoy the time spent with both families. When I first volunteered I was really unsure what to expect – would I like the families I had been given? Would they like me? Would I be able to understand their problems or would they be too much for me to cope with? I feel that I have been very lucky with my families- both of them (although with very different problems) are kind, keen for me to visit and very welcoming. It is a great privilege to be welcomed into someone's home and both families have been very open and honest about their problems.

Although I know that I can't help or change their situation, I feel that I can be a sympathetic ear, and, by giving them time to talk, I can help ease the burden of their troubles –help them realize that there is light at the end of the tunnel, signpost them to agencies that can help and generally just make them feel that they are not alone and that somebody cares.

I am using Tools For Life with my new family and they are enjoying all aspects of it, being very keen to take on any suggestions. I can see the little boy already growing in confidence and I can't wait to hear how he gets on with his first visit to "big school" next week.

In a wider sense I am very grateful to Homestart for the other volunteers I have met –I couldn't have hoped to meet a nicer, more caring, funny bunch of people. I have enjoyed all the extra training that's been given and any opportunity to meet up.

When people ask me "what do you get out of Homestart?" I suppose it's connecting with people, the feeling of being able to help others and the personal satisfaction to see families gain in confidence as they work through their own personal challenges.


Map of Wokingham Borough. Showing families supported by Home-start Wokingham District

The Tools for Life project is well under way and going from strength to strength. Once the training materials had been written and resources made, I was ready to deliver the first training session to existing volunteers in February 2019. This was well received by the volunteers who all felt it was something they could use in the family home. Tools for Life training has now also been incorporated into the prep course.

We now have 66% of our volunteers who have completed a one-off training session, with a further training session being held in September. Two members of staff from the Red Kite Children's Centre also attended one of the training sessions and gave positive feedback.

As well as sharing good practice with the Children's Centres and pre-schools in the Wokingham District I have worked very closely with Emma Griffith, Wokingham Borough Council Early Years Advisor, who has supported me with training materials and data from the Wokingham area which I was able to include in the Tools for Life sessions and more recently offering guidance with planning for our new family group, Chat and Play.

There are five families with seven children currently being supported in the family home with Tools for life being offered alongside the core support. The volunteers complete a diary sheet with outcomes for both children and parents. There is also an option for the volunteers to use a resource bag to take into the family home to work with the family on specific skills; one of these areas could be around speech and language, amongst other things there is a tea-set and teddy which encourages talking and listening also story books for parents to share with their children. I have personally been working with a family using the Tools for Life training and resources since January. The mum I am supporting has been willing to adapt her approach towards her child which has had a massive impact on her child's speech leading to improved changes in his behaviour at home and especially at nursery.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the volunteers and trustees who have attended the training sessions and offered good constructive feedback enabling the training to stay up to date and relevant.

Annual Financial Report 2018/2019

Financial Report 2018/2019

The summary Home-Start Wokingham District accounts for the year ending 31 March 2019 are set out below and they represent the day to day operations of the scheme. They have been independently examined by Mr Tim Kingcott ACMA ATT.

Financial Status

Home-Start Wokingham District received its funding during the year from a variety of sources but in the main from The Big Lottery Fund and from other national/local organisations and trusts. We received the first year's funding (4 year project) of £37,985 from The Big Lottery relating to Tools for Life and a further £10,000 relating to Awards for All. We received £24,000 from Wokingham Borough Council, £15,000 from MCKS Pranic Healing and £5,000 from Wokingham United Charities. The Scheme also received a large number of smaller donations that each made a valuable contribution towards our income total of £100,044. Our expenditure was £91,822 resulting in a net surplus of £8,222. Our net assets excluding pension liability total £85,616.

From a financial point of view 2018-2019 was less challenging than the previous year. The funding received from the above organisations enabled the trustees to reverse the difficult decisions that were made in the previous year. We increased the working hours of all the staff. Whilst our short term funding is secure the trustees will continue to monitor its resources on a regular basis and make difficult decisions if necessary to ensure the long term viability of the scheme.

The Contingency Fund (Reserves)

The Charity held £50,000 in reserve at the year end. This is held within the general fund and is designed to help finance any situation that the scheme may find itself in at short notice. Closure of the scheme would result in employment redundancy compensation being payable as well as employer debt on withdrawal from the pension scheme. The Charity aims to maintain the reserves in line with guidance from the Charity Commission on an ongoing basis. We review our reserves' fund on an annual basis.

The Future

Fortunately the Scheme's short term future is looking much brighter now thanks to the tremendous efforts of the fundraising team. In addition to the organisations listed above we have have received funding from Comic Relief, Kirath Trust, Garfield Weston and Woodward Trust. The trustees very much appreciate all these contributions which secure the short term future of the Scheme. We believe we offer tremendous value for money to local families who rely on our professional help so much and that we make a major contribution to our local community. Unfortunately the demand for our services is increasing and we are unable to cope within our existing resources. We are committed to continuing our vital work in the community for as long as possible. To achieve this aim we are recruiting a new part time member of staff dedicated to fund raising.
